There are more than 10 Volunteers helping on the day.


Why not come along as an observer to the Awards for Photographic Merit?

Starting at 10.30am, the day will be nerve wrecking for those who have submitted for either Credit, Distinction or Master of the Photographic Alliance of Great Britain, but you can you sit and enjoy the show of over 1000 images!

Successful or not, it's a journey of learning from making then choosing your images to editing, to printing and mounting. On the day over 85 entrants will be chewing their fingers and sweating!

A panel of 6 highly accomplished adjudicators will be allocating votes to each image. A YES vote is recorded by pressing 4 and a NO vote by pressing 2. A near miss is voted with 3. All 6 voting yes (4) will score an image 24 points. Candidates for Credit have 10 images entered, Distinctions are 15 images and Masters are 20 images. A score of 200 is required to secure CPAGB and 300 for DPAGB and 450 for MPAGB.

Sincere thanks to Brian McClure who was involved in the organising of this event for the last two years and who recently stepped down. Thanks to Chelle McGaughey for taking over the role.

Will McCrum Memorial Competition 2022


Portraiture

Prints may be entered to any combination of the Monochrome, Colour and Nature Categories, and awards are made to individual prints and to one or more Clubs. Prints are then selected for the Exhibition. The deadline is 25th November, however, Rod Wheelans is accepting entries at the APM on 26th November 2022 in Antrim!



Treasurer:

Accept annual payments from Clubs

Accept individual payments from members for individual competition or exhibition fees such as NIPA exhibition etc. Keep a list of the accounts. Present a list of income and expenses to Council each month. Pay bills for equipment, Adjudication hosting and other expenses. Deposit cheques to the bank. Ensure that accounts are audited. Be a signatory. Approx. 2-4 hours per month should keep on top of it. **Assistant Secretary:** Take and write up minutes at NIPA Council meetings Be back up to the Secretary if not available. Assist on Adjudication nights to set up and take down etc.



All About Anita (woo hoo!)

I thought I'd end with an introduction to myself. I got my first camera at the age of 10, indeed a mighty 40 years ago! A small 110 film camera. I loved to capture scenes to show to others after the moment had passed.

At 18, I moved to Wales to study for my BSc in Biology and Environmental Pollution Science, then a Masters in Applied Hydrobiology (Freshwater) in Cardiff. I worked as a biologist and fisheries scientist with the Environment Agency. At this stage my photography was simply recording everyday life.

When I moved to England within the Environment Agency, I decided to purchase my first DSLR and I studied City & Guilds Photography from 1997 in Poole, Dorset. After my dad died in 1998, I moved back to NI to study for a PhD in Aquatic Toxicology. During my studies, I finished my C&G modules and studied for an A' Level in Photography also gaining my LRPS. In 2002, I backpacked around the world for 10 months and after marrying Dave at the end of our travels in 2003, we moved to Windsor, Ontario, Canada.

We lived in Canada for 3.5 years where I worked as a Post-doctoral researcher and our first son was born. I attended Windsor Camera Club which was one of several clubs within the Greater Detroit Camera Club Council. When a job opportunity arose in New Zealand, we moved to Dunedin on the South Island. I was an active member of Dunedin Photographic Society and Dunedin Camera Club. Three years later, we moved to Christchurch, and I joined Christchurch Photographic Society, a club of 200 members. I was club secretary there for about 4 years. The earthquakes in Christchurch rattled us literally, and we moved south to Timaru where I joined Focus Aorangi Camera club. I had two more boys during our time in Dunedin and our fourth boy in Timaru! By this stage I was a full time mum, but I had started fitness photography at a ladies gym. I gained a very prestigious Gold Medal and Robinson Trophy in Landscape photography in 2013 in New Zealand National Exhibition with my image Moeraki Boulder Flora (see below) plus my Licentiateship of the Photographic Society of NZ. The panel commented 'that in a place that was photographed to death, you came up with a novel photo'.

After my mum passed of cancer, we returned to NI in 2014 as a caregiver for my brother. I joined Enniskillen Photographic Society (EPS) in 2014 and was Chair of the club for 4 years.


During my time as Chair, I brought club members up to Adjudication nights, and that's where the **'woo hoo'** started as I was calling out the PDI names and celebrating the successes of EPS! I relinquished my role of Chair when I accepted the role of Vice President.



All About Anita (woo hoo!)

I have a passion for completing panels, though I'm known for doing them in a rush! For all but one time, that has worked out (albeit a few sleepless nights) and I wouldn't recommend it either! I gained my Associateship of the Photographic Society of New Zealand in 2015. When I failed my Associateship of the Irish Photographic Federation the first time in 2020, I learnt so much more. I have since gained my AIPF, literally only two weeks after gaining my Fellowship of the Photographic Society of New Zealand. My style is Conceptual Still Life. Some of you will have seen it on NIPA day last year. There's more in my head, I just need to make some time to make it happen! I have a plan for my next few panels, and I'm enjoying the challenge of working on different panels for each award. There's just so much learning in the process.





I'm passionate about photography; learning about it, making images, teaching it and judging. I have a small photography business currently. I also work alongside my husband as an environmental consultant based in Brookeborough, Co. Fermanagh. I operate two self catering properties, one near Kesh in Fermanagh and the other in Castlerock, on the north coast. I tutor and judge at Maguiresbridge camera club and volunteer for the charity Remember my baby. I sit on the Board of Governors at my youngest son's school. I help my brother on the farm so in January and February I'm lambing and from March I'm calving cows. Then there's all the running around with the family activities for 4 boys and my husband. And sometimes I sleep.

And then there's the role of Acting President, for which I have so much enthusiasm and many ideas. This newsletter has been one of them (it may not be as long as this next time!), alongside greater communication with members, and a regular coffee morning. I'd like to see a number of workshops, plus another Association Day or two, come to fruition too as well as a few more ideas to flesh out. Of course we need to work as a team to achieve the growth and ultimately the 'advancement of photography in all its forms' which is our core objective.

So let's get thinking of this both ways 'What can NIPA do for you? and what can you do for NIPA?'
